TIDINGS OF COMFORT & JOY BECAUSE OF YOUR KINDNESS

PALOMA'S STORY IS A TESTAMENT to how your faithful support makes it possible for MEND to serve a family facing a sudden, and desperate situation.

Two months ago, right before MEND shut down for the holidays, we were alerted to the plight of a mother who was homeless with two small children. Fleeing domestic violence, Paloma and her 6 and 3 year old toddlers had nowhere to go. They needed everything—safety, food, shelter and someone who would listen.... and help.

Paloma had reached out to local shelters, but as is often the case during December, nothing was available. Luckily, she had secured a 10-night stay at a motel in Tarzana through a local organization that serves domestic violence survivors.

When MEND's community ambassadors located her, they handdelivered a care package with food, hygiene items, blankets, rain ponchos, clothing, and gifts for the children. The humanity this represented brought Paloma to tears. Then they sat down and listened.



The 2-week motel stay she'd secured was enough to bring her into the new year, but she was desperate for a longer term solution.

Because of kind people like you, MEND got to work and secured a 27-day stay for the family at a safe and family-friendly location. This temporary arrangement offered immediate relief, ensuring that Paloma's small family had a roof over their heads beyond the critical holiday period.

We recently checked in with Paloma, to see how she's doing. We learned that she has not given up. Following multiple calls to local agencies, she's finally on a promising waitlist for long-term housing. She is very grateful for the kindness she received during a very tough time for her family and is looking forward to rebuilding her life.









GRIT, PERSEVERANCE & RESILIENCE

BRENDA RECALLS TURNING TO MEND for food as a 15 year-old teen mom. Her abusive father was gone, her mother couldn't cope, and she and her two siblings were forced to work to survive.

Challenging times followed—80-hour weeks, single parenting, finishing high school late, some encounters with the juvenile justice system, and a dustup that sent her to jail as an adult.

Through it all, Brenda remained determined to power through.

She says: "There's nothing lower than the bottom of the barrel. From there all you can do is look up." Last year, at age 28, she made a conscious choice to start over. To leave the daily hamster wheel, and to try her hand at business with her partner, John.

But they needed assistance to make the leap. To get food and critical support to make it through those lean early months. Brenda circled back to MEND, just as she had 13 years ago.

"Sometimes we're scared or embarrassed to ask for help because we're not where we want to be," Brenda shares.

MEND offered sustenance, connections, and encouragement. But Brenda and John's hard work and ingenuity were the real drivers. They started small, with car detailing, and moved up to pressure washing and disinfecting entire parking lots of rental moving trucks. They seized the chance to learn more, gaining knowledge and skills from all the corporate vendor training and group experiences they could get.

Recently, the couple created an LLC, made flyers, and started knocking on doors.

"It hasn't been easy, but we've made it work," says John.



Now they're planning to level up—adding more parking lots, hiring another crew, and expanding beyond just the two of them.

Demonstrating just how far they have come from the days when they leaned on MEND for food and other resources, Brenda and John are soon going to participate in a MEND Job Fair next month, to meet and open opportunities to people with the same drive and desire to overcome & succeed.

John is intent on this: "We want to be part of [the solution]... to open doors for people in need of work."

VOLUNTEER HIGHLIGHT

Danny Sandoval shares: "I was in sales, where the money you make is important...not what you do for others. Then a friend who worked here at MEND suggested volunteering. She's always recruiting. She said, 'I NEED you to come.' I didn't hesitate. She got her mom and other friends to come too!'

"I came to help with food distribution. I packed bags, and I saw the challenges people were facing. So many people coming to pick up food.'

"I brought my son with me to volunteer. He's an only child, 13 years old—maybe a little bit spoiled. I wanted him to learn that not everyone gets to go to Target and just pick what they want for the holidays. I wanted to make it real, not just what his parents say about poverty. I made him wake up early to get here with me at 7:30 in the morning."

"He helped give out games and toys, and he saw the reality—so many people waiting in line and other kids so grateful for the food and games from MEND. He could see it in their eyes, in their body language—'We'll have real food for now, and a game too!' On the way home, he said, 'Dad [helping] really feels good.'

"[Volunteering] here is fulfilling. You realize your problems are not so big. Most of us take food security for granted. We complain about standing in the grocery store line for 5 minutes, and these people are waiting for 2 hours! The lengths people go to overcome the problems they're going through! And we just take our privileges for granted."

FAST FORWARD A FEW MONTHS. Danny's car sales business was closing and he was at loose ends. Learning about a job opening at MEND, he applied and was hired!

He says: "I feel good, helping other people. When I tell people what I do, it's always a good conversation. Even at different Costco stores, where I go to, people know MEND. And then, obviously, I try to convince them to come and volunteer! We're always looking for more people to help! My sales pitch to them is that it'll feel good, it'll be fulfilling."
